Visitors of all ages will enjoy learning about the myriad ways that birds nurture and protect their young. The exhibition features stunning displays of egg diversity, showcasing specimens that range in size from the basketball-sized egg of the elephant bird to tiny hummingbird eggs.

Nuzi and the Hurrians: Fragments from a Forgotten Past

An exhibition of artifacts from the Hurrian kingdom of Mesopotamia, which around 1500 BCE emerged as a world power equal in influence to Egypt and Babylonia.

Houses of Ancient Israel: Domestic, Royal, Divine

This exhibit examines life in an ancient Near Eastern agricultural society through the architecture and artifacts of that epoch. The large-scale recreations include a family dwelling, a palace and a temple.

Ancient Cyprus: The Cesnola Collection

In 1865, United States consul General Luigi de Palma Cesnola led an excavation of artifacts from the Mediterranean island nation of Cyprus. The exhibition features copper and ceramic antiquities from this legendary treasure hunt.
